





Legal foundations

Which target groups are there?

- 1. EU citizens + citizens of Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland
- 2. Third-country nationals

Rules for third-country nationals in Austria

- 1. >6 months: residence permit (Aufenthaltstitel)
- 2. Work permit to work in Austria (Beschäftigungsbewilligung)
- 3. Many permits combine the work and residence permit (e.g., RWR Cards)



Working as an international student/graduate





During your studies

Work permit (**Beschäftigungs-bewilligung**), applied for by the employer

Possible part time or full time

Attention: Potential labour market test (**Ersatzkraftverfahren**) by AMS if employment > 20h/week

Only possible if your Residence Permit Student (**Aufenthaltsbewilligung Student**) is valid



As a Graduate

Extension of the Residence Permit Student for another year in order to look for a job

Afterwards you are eligible to apply for a Red-White-Red card for Graduates for 2 years

Long-term options

Red-White-Red Card Plus: 3 years

Long-Term Resident EU Permit (**Daueraufenthalt EU**): 5 years

Example



- Zeinab H., Albanian citizen,
 26 years old
- Graduate in Tirana (Bachelor)
- Recently graduated in Austria (Master)
- German level A2 (university language course)
- English level C2
- No work experience yet

Job offer in Austria:

- Job in an Austrian international company, full time (38,5h)
- € 40.000 gross/year as planned salary (starters salary according to collective agreement)

What does this mean for an international student?

Job needs to mirror the field of academic education and be a binding offer



University degree must be completed at an Austrian university



Minimum salary: collective agreement / standard company payment









Internship for International Students

Internship for students who study in Austria ("Berufs- oder Ferialpraktikum")

- 1. Prerequisite: current studies at a university or university of applied sciences in Austria, internship is "required" for the studies
- Notification at AMS by employer; AMS issues confirmation of notification ("Anzeigebestätigung")
- Valid Residence Permit
 Student
 ("Aufenthaltsbewilligung
 Student")

Voluntary internship ("Voluntariat")

- 1. Prerequisite: duration of up to 3 months;
 Purpose: expanding/
 applying knowledge,
 acquisition of skills for practice;
 no work obligation and no entitlement to remuneration
- Notification at AMS by employer (see above)
- Valid Residence Permit Student or Visa C for Gainful Purposes

Erasmus+ Internship

- Prerequisite: Internship within the framework of Erasmus+ or another EU exchange program (IAESTE, ELSA)
- Application for <u>exemption</u> <u>confirmation</u> at AMS by intern (optional!)
- No additional visa required if valid residence title student of another EU MS; otherwise visa C or D for gainful purposes

Internship within the framework of the EU-Researcher and Student Directive

- 1. Prerequisite: 3-6-month study-related internship, ongoing (or completed no more than 2 years ago) studies in a third country (i.e., NOT EU)
- 2. <u>Notification</u> at AMS by employer; AMS issues confirmation of notification ("Anzeigebestätigung")
- 3. Visa D for interns

Application letter/ Motivation letter

Samples of your work (if requested by the company)

Education certificates

Reference letters



Apply for a job in Austria

Curriculum Vitae

- First and family name, academic title if you have one
- Address, telephone number, e-mail address
- The different stages of your education, other advanced courses and seminars
- Military or civilian service
- Internships
- Professional career path including specific positions, focus and scope of your work
- Foreign language competencies (with the European framework of reference)
- Special skills and interests
- Date and signature (add a scanned handwritten signature to the digital CV)
- Voluntary information: date and place of birth, marital status, nationality, children, driving license)
- Including a photo is recommended

Motivational Letter

- Your name, address, telephone number and email address
- Date
- Recipient and his/her address correct personal form of address/academic titles
- Subject of the letter
- Adjust the contents of the application letter to the specific potential place of work.
 Present the reasons why you are precisely the right person for this job.
- Address your letter, if possible, to the right contact person
- Avoid spelling mistakes. Have another person proofread your letter.
- Keep the letter brief. The letter should not be longer than one A4 page.
- Scan and include your handwritten signature at the end of the document



Austrian working culture

Austrian business etiquette

- The correct way to greet someone – greetings informal and formal
- Correct use of academic degrees and titles
- Punctuality
- Agree to compromises showing goodwill
- Find balance between work and social contacts – networking is key
- The right outfit for work
- Small talk in Austria food, culture, sights and sports
- Dealing with business partners – customer is king
- Behaviour at business meals – manners

What employers want

- Capacity for teamwork
- Communication skills
- Working independently take responsibility
- Flexibility
- Precision

Working hours

- According to your corresponding collective agreements (in German) for various sectors:
- Full-time: 32.5-40 h/week
- 5 days/week: 25 working days
- Sick leave days, family care leave, special days of leave (wedding, moving, funerals)


Salaries in Austria

- In the EU, the income of Austria's full-time employees is rated in the upper third
- Special bonus payments in Austria: the 13th and 14th salary
- Different tax classes
 according to salary –
 Brutto-Netto-Rechner
 (gross net tax calculator)
